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#### Kitchen Rehab ROI

"Kitchens and bathrooms are what sell homes," explains Sam Olson, team lead/owner of The Olson Group of RE/MAX Gold in Reno. Olson goes on to say that investing in a kitchen remodel pays off in the long run, with sellers getting 60 to 80 percent return on investment. He says the bare minimum for a kitchen to see a real ROI will include granite countertops, updated cupboards, and gas appliances.

Karen Walker Hill, residential specialist for Ferrari-Lund Real Estate in Reno, concurs with Olson and says there's a benefit to creating your ideal kitchen before putting it on the market.

"Looking at it from a real estate point of view, if you're waiting to update your kitchen because you're going to sell it in five years, do it now and enjoy it because you will get the money back," she says.

#### **Considering a New Space**

With booming interest in relocating in the Reno-Tahoe area, Shane Braninburg, mortgage consultant with Big Valley Mortgage in Reno, urges those thinking about buying new homes to get on it now.





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"At this point, sellers are seeing multiple offers on every property," he explains. "It's not even a housing market; it's like a cake auction. The most immediate action is to reach out to a local lender or a local real estate adviser. They can help you understand your capital situation, what you want to spend on a monthly payment, and what you're willing to spend."

When it comes to finding a new home, the right kitchen speaks volumes. Betsy Caron, realtor with Berkshire Hathaway HomeServices Drysdale Properties in Sparks, recalls, "When my boyfriend and I were looking for our house, it needed to be in a specific area, and we needed a bigger kitchen so I could cook. Now I have this beautiful kitchen that's in the middle of our house. It's the heart of the home. When I have people over, everyone can see what's going on."

"I put homemade tomato soup on the stove, we all gathered around the counter, and it made for a truly memorable party."

Speaking of the layout, Charlotte Michaels, owner and founder of Transcend Interiors in Reno, emphasizes the functionality and design of a kitchen.

"It's nice to have a super-stylish kitchen, but if it doesn't work for the people who live there, it's not worth it," she says. "With newly built homes, in the design centers, they tend to push the latest and greatest backsplashes and countertops. We work with our homeowners and with what they're bringing into the new home. #### **Convection Steam Ovens**

When it comes to the latest and greatest in appliances, it's all about convection steam ovens, explains Steve Gunderson, kitchen designer for Czyz's Appliance in Reno. He urges folks to check out the Wolf Convection Steam Oven, which allows home chefs to cook with steam in a climate-controlled environment unlike others.

"It aids in baking breads because you get a hint of steam at just the right time in the cycle," Gunderson notes. "You can poach a salmon or steam vegetables nicely. You get food that looks and tastes like it was prepared in areas much more humid than ours."


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#### **All About Organizing**

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
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
